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What is Intra-Operative Cell Salvage?

Cell Salvage is the process of recovering blood lost in surgery, filtering and processing it, and then returning it back to the same patient. The process can take 15-30 minutes, sometimes longer, and has the same rules, safety precautions and practices as donated blood transfusions.

How does it work?

When blood is lost during surgery, the theatre staff will harvest the blood loss from the patient being operated on, to stop unwanted particles and fragments blocking the machine or going back to the patient. The blood goes through a sponge like filter, it is washed with saline, and then re-infused back into the patient. This process is known as **Intra-operative cell salvage** (IOCS).

Who is eligible?

Only some types of surgery are appropriate for IOCS. A clinical decision will be made by the surgeon and anaesthetist, who will also consider the availability of the machine and operator.

When might intra-operative cell salvage be used?

- Procedures with a higher risk of blood loss
- Patients with rare blood groups
- For religious beliefs or refusal of donated blood transfusions
- To supplement donated blood transfusions

When might cell salvage not be suitable for a patient?

For certain types of procedures, such as bowel or gastric surgery. Any other contraindications that may be updated or changed following national guidance.
