












Midline Patient information

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


Why do I need a midline?

A midline is recommended for patients who need long term antibiotics (up to six weeks) or have difficult intravenous access (hard to inject in a vein) to reduce the number of times a cannula has to be inserted into a vein.

Midlines are also suitable for an intravenous antibiotic course at home (outpatient parenteral antimicrobial therapy).

A midline will reduce the amount of vein punctures a person has and support with vessel health preservation.



What is a midline?

A midline is a narrow, hollow tube (catheter) that is put into a vein in the arm, usually above the elbow. Ultrasound is used to identify the vein to be accessed. The tip of the catheter will lie 7.5 to 25 cm in length within the axillary vein (the vein in the shoulder)

The midline will be dressed with a semi-permeable dressing on a weekly basis (at a home setting or at the hospital), unless indicated otherwise.

To protect the dressing from becoming wet (especially when washing), it should be covered with a bath guard or alternative eg: clingfilm

Do not submerge your midline in water.

Activities

You should be able to move your arm freely, without any restraint. Do not feel that you must keep your arm immobile. However, we advise you avoid activities such as tennis, golf, and vigorous gym exercise. Please do not swim with your midline.

Removing the midline

When your course of treatment has finished, the midline will be removed by a healthcare professional. This is done by gently pulling the catheter out of your arm and should be pain free.
